REVIEW OF THE BEHAVIOR

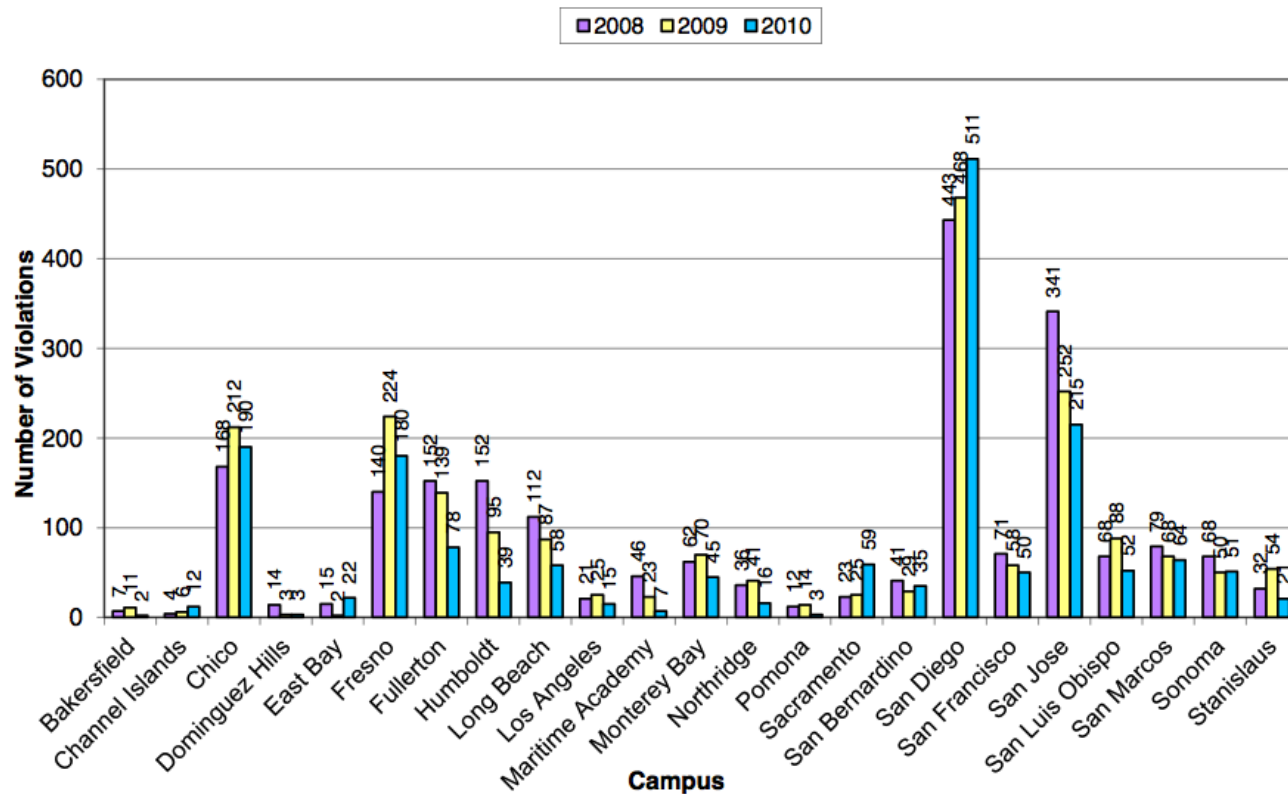
Issues	Data
SDSU “Binge” Drinking	30% or about 8,000 students during a 2-week period
SDSU student alcohol related problems	Black Outs (26.6%) Missed work/class (16.3%) Drove impaired (11%)
SDSU Medical/detox transports	41 in first 7-weeks
National Statistics	1,800 college student alcohol-related deaths 600,000 assaults 500,00 injuries
Statewide campus survey (41) increasing problems	75% Marijuana 72% Prescription drugs



VIGOROUS ENFORCEMENT TRADITION

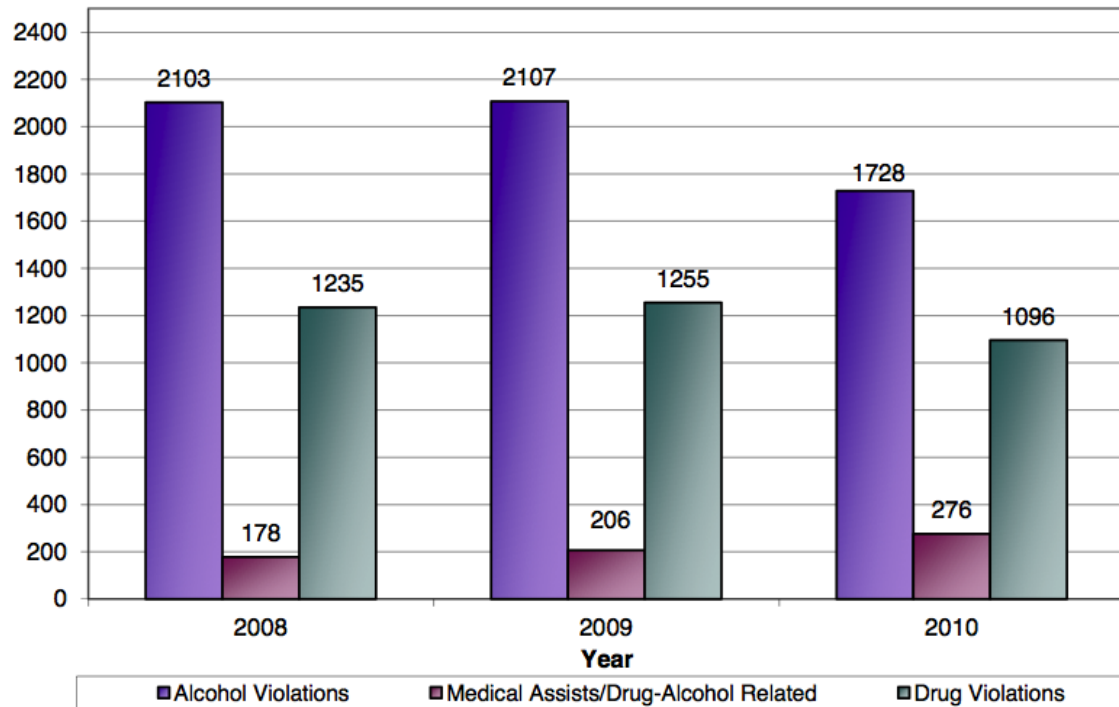
Alcohol-related Violations

MEDICAL ASSISTS

2008 - 2010 CSU Systemwide Comparison
(Consisting of Alcohol Violations, Medical Assists, Drug Violations)



Alcohol violations showed a decrease in 2010, down to 1,728. Drug violations decreased in 2010 with 159 less violations than 2009. Medical assists relating to drugs and alcohol increased to 276 in 2010, up from 206 the previous year.

- Recovery Support
- Pre-Trouble Identification
- Student Organization Policies
- Program evaluation and quality assurance



PRIORITY REQUESTS

1. Recovery Programs –

- Create a campus climate that is supportive of students in recovery.
 - Survey results estimate that about 500 students have an identified substance use disorder.
 - Likely many more students will develop or are currently living with an undiagnosed substance use disorder
 - Stigma associated with these disorders is well established and a barrier to diagnosis and recovery
- Build on the ally model
 - Collaborative curriculum development process with the School of Social Work and C&PS to train staff, faculty and students.



PRIORITY REQUESTS

2. Voluntary Screening and Brief Intervention, Referral to Treatment
 - Offer screening to students visiting SHS
 - Social Work graduate interns provide brief intervention and referrals
 - Referrals are to C&PS ASPIRE program (free and voluntary)
 - Two-year phased rollout with evaluation component testing feasibility and efficacy



FUTURE WORK AND REQUESTS



- Bring together key campus personnel to make policy recommendations to the President that change the approval process for student organization events when alcohol is served.
